WHEN SHOULD WE WRITE A WILL?

For many people who already have a Will it could be out-of-date since the time it was prepared. For example you may stipulate that your home or other property (and personal possessions) should be transferred or divided amongst beneficiaries but you no longer live in that house and may have divested property, perhaps some of your beneficiaries may have passed away.

If you don't have a Will its time to get your affairs in order.

Take a look at the following list of events that indicate when you should write or update your Will.

- change of Executor/s
- changes to your marital status
- changes to your financial situation such as a significant increase or decrease in your assets
- loss of your spouse
- birth of children and grandchildren
- changes in circumstances with people named in your Will
- inclusion or updating charities
- personal details may have changed
- medical conditions of you or your dependents
- purchase of a new family home

SEEKING LEGAL ADVICE

Your Will is an important legal document and it is best completed by a legal professional. While most Wills can be straightforward, others are complicated and require specific legal skills to get your intentions correctly worded. This can alleviate problems when your Will is used to organise your final arrangements and to distribute your estate. Your solicitor can keep your Will in safe custody and give you copies. It's always a good idea to discuss the contents of your Will with family members or close friends so that they understand what you have decided to do and it's an opportunity for you to answer any questions that they may have.

TYPES OF GIFTS IN WILLS

A gift in your Will is a legacy to people and organisations from your estate. Your estate is the total value of all of your assets at the time you pass away.

This includes bank deposits, shares in companies, property, personal possessions, vehicles and other investments.

You can specify how you will allocate your estate in various ways including:

- a specific amount of money
- a gift of your whole estate
- property that you own
- a percentage of your estate
- gifts of specific belongings such as jewellery & household contents
- the residue of your estate after you have provide for your loved ones

Note: when considering leaving a legacy it's a good idea not to be too restrictive in stipulating its use be-

cause a program operating today could be cancelled in the future.

BENEFITING FUTURE GENERATIONS

A gift in your Will to the people and causes that align with your passion to help solve problems in the world is the penultimate act of charity that you make. It doesn't cost anything in your lifetime and is only activated after your passing. Like many people it can be difficult to support charitable causes financially but you could be in a position to leave a gift in your Will.

Charities depend on income from bequests to fund future projects and your generosity can live on for decades and provides opportunities and hope for future generations.





THINGS TO CONSIDER

There are a number of important things to consider and important decisions to make before you make a Will.

Including your loved ones

Looking after your loved ones will no doubt be your highest priority. Think about who you want to include as beneficiaries of your Estate – it might include your siblings, children, nieces and nephews, grandchildren and close friends.

Including a charity

If you have decided to leave a gift to charity in your Will, you will need to decide which one. You might have a favourite charity that you have supported in the past, or there may be a cause that is close to your heart. Or you might like to include several charities and cover a number of causes that are important to you. You can search for a specific charity or cause and find out what difference a gift in your Will could make.

Remember that gifts in Wills are an important source of income for many charities and enable them to carry out much of their vital work. If you do want to leave a charitable gift when making a Will, you can decide how small or large your gift is.

If you are still thinking about including a charity but aren't yet sure, you might like to read about how easy it is to leave a gift to charity.

To help you decide on whether or

not to include a charity, or to help you decide which charity to choose, reflect on what is most important to you and what legacy you would like to leave for future generations, and perhaps make a list of causes and charities in order of priorities. This should help you make a decision you feel comfortable with.

Looking after your children

If you have children under the age of 18, you will need to decide who you would like to take care of them if you die before they reach the age of consent.

Distributing your assets

You will also need to think about what assets make up your Estate, who you want to have them and how they should be distributed (for example, a percentage of your Estate given after a specific beneficiary reaches a certain age).

You might also want to think about passing on your digital assets when making a Will, such as music and photo collections.

Some useful information on the different ways in which Estates can be distributed is given in more detail on the How to leave a gift to charity page.

If you have a very complex Estate

and wish to distribute in an intricate manner, we recommend that you seek professional legal advice.

Handling your affairs

The people that you nominate in your Will to handle your affairs after you're gone are called Executors: they can be friends, family members, professionals or any combination of these. It is common and advisable for two people to share the task of executing your Will. Gifts can be anything you own including specific items, money, property or a percentage of your Estate.

When choosing an Executor, think about who would be best placed to deal with your affairs: someone you trust, is business-minded and perhaps is not a beneficiary in your Will. Alternatively, your Executor/s could be professional advisors, but bear in mind that there will be a charge for their services.

Funeral arrangements

In addition to detailing the distribution of your Estate, your Will is also an opportunity for you to state what you would like to happen at your funeral. This takes away the guess work and can greatly reduce the burden on your loved ones while they are grieving, as well as ensure that your wishes are carried out.

HOW TO LEAVE A GIFT TO CHARITY

Making a Will is the only way you can be sure your wishes will be followed after you die. It also means less confusion and heartache for your loved ones in their time of grief. If you don't make a Will, part or all of your Estate may end up going to people you never intended to benefit because the law will dictate how your Estate is distributed.

If you have no next of kin and no Will, your Estate will automatically pass to the Crown. If you do have relatives, they may disagree about what should happen with your Estate. Your Will clearly explains your intentions and ensures they are carried out.

Preparing your Will

There are two choices: you can write your Will yourself, or you can engage a professional to write your Will for you.

Writing a Will yourself may seem to be the easier and less costly option, but do-it-yourself kits and online options are often simplified and leave out some important details, such as what is to happen if a beneficiary is deceased at the time of your death.

By engaging a professional, such as a solicitor or public trustee with extensive experience in writing a Will, you can be confident that your Will covers all important aspects and considerations. You can find a legal professional through the Law Society or Institute in your state or territory.

Should you choose to have a legal professional write your Will, you should make some decisions about your Will and write them down prior to meeting with them.

Including a charity

We're often not able to give as generously during our lives as we might like to. Leaving a gift in your Will is a great way to support the vital work of charities we've always wanted to help but were previously unable to, or to increase the level of giving to a charity you've supported all your life.

By leaving a charitable gift in your Will – either a percentage of your Estate, a specific sum of money or other assets – you will have a positive impact on the lives of many Australians, including potentially your own children, family and friends.

Your gift, whether large of small, will be most gratefully received by your chosen charity. If you have any questions about leaving a charitable gift in your Will, please contact your chosen charity to discuss it with them in detail. You will find their contact details on their individual page.

Find a Charity

Different types of gifts

There are four main types of gifts you can leave in your Will, including those you may leave to charity.

Residual

One of the most common ways to leave a charitable gift, a residual gift is the remainder of your Estate after first leaving gifts to your loved ones and payment of any financial commitments, funeral arrangements etc

Example wording

I leave to (CHARITY NAME) of (CHARITY ADDRESS) Charity ABN: (xxxxx) (proportion of residue to be

completed) for its general purposes and I direct that the receipt of the Treasurer or other duly authorised officer shall be a sufficient discharge to my Executors.

Pecuniary or specific

Another common way to leave a charitable gift, a pecuniary or specific gift clearly specifies the donation: it can be money, property, stocks and/or shares.

Example wording

I leave to (CHARITY NAME) of (CHARITY ADDRESS) Charity ABN: (xxxxx) (description of item) absolutely for the general purposes of the said charity and I direct that the receipt of the Treasurer or other duly authorised officer shall be a sufficient discharge to my Executors.

Percentage or fractional

A gift expressed as a percentage or fraction of your Estate. Dividing your Estate by a percentage or fraction takes into account the changing value of your Estate: this could be due to factors such as inflation, property fluctations and changes to the composition of your Estate over time.

Whole estate

This comprises your entire Estate and is usually left by those without family or other preferred beneficiaries, or those wanting to achieve something very significant with their gift.

Discuss with your solicitor the type of gift that will best suit you and your Estate.

Charitable gifts in Wills of property, stocks and shares are exempt from capital gains tax.

St Vincent's was built on the generosity of its benefactors, whether through donations, gifts in kind, volunteering or a bequest made in a Will. The strongest support often comes from grateful patients, friends and families who chose to give back through a bequest after their lifetime to acknowledge the care they received.

Bequests have enabled St Vincent's to build a new hospice for the dying, purchase life-saving equipment, support world-first clinical trials, and fund essential medical treatment for the vulnerable and marginalised in our community. The extraordinary story of the Brothers began with the founder John Baptist de La Salle. The life of this young priest took a series of unexpected turns when he began helping a local teacher run a charity school for the poor. What began as a generous effort to help gradually became his life's work.



John Baptist De La Salle, 1651 – 1719, began his work for the poor, when he started helping a local teacher run a charity school. He chose to leave his comfortable life and gathered a group of young men to assist him in providing poor children with an appropriate education. The men called themselves Brothers. John Baptist was later canonised, and proclaimed Patron of Teachers.

De La Salle recognised the importance of developing positive relationships with students and urged the Brothers to be "older brothers" to the young people in their care.

Today Brothers with their associates work in difficult and challenging places where there is great need. You can be a part of this. "From everyone who has been given much, even more will be demanded." (Luke 12:48)

The Lasallian Mission in Australia, New Zealand, Pakistan and Papua New Guinea encompasses more than thirty schools, two Teachers Colleges, and many other related works involving more than 3,000 co-workers.

Lasallian volunteers, mostly recent graduates of year 12 Lasallian schools, work with some of the most disadvantaged children in the region, including Balgo, Western Australia, and Port Moresby, Papua New Guinea.



FAMOUS GIFTS LEFT IN WILLS

Over the years many famous people have left gifts in their Wills to causes they were passionate about. These legacies continue today as a testament to their wishes to create a better world.



Edmund Resch Jnr (1929-1963) bequeathed the grand Darling Point manor *Swifts* to the Roman Catholic Church and was used for a number of years as the home of the Catholic Archbishop of Sydney. Pope Paul VI was accommodated at *Swifts* as the guest of Cardinal Gilroy during the fist ever Papal visit to Australia in 1970. Another papal visitor was Pope John Paul Il who also stayed at *Swifts* during his 1986 visit. The Australian Heritage Council described *Swifts* as "perhaps the grandest house remaining in Sydney".


May Gibbs made several provisions in her Will for children's charitable causes. When she passed away in 1969 two Sydney charities were bequeathed equal shares in the copyright to her stories and illustrations, such as *Bib and Bub*, *Snugglepot and Cuddlepie* and the *Banksia Men*.

The **Walkley Awards** recognise excellence in Australian journalism and were created by **Sir William Walkley**, founder of Ampol Petroleum. He was a generous benefactor and he left a sum of money in 1976 for the awards to continue. The *Walkley Awards* are regarded as Australia's version of the Pulitzer Prize.

Author Stella Maria Miles Franklin's first book was *My Brilliant Career* and she made provision in her Will for the prestigious Miles Franklin Literary Award established after her death in 1957.

Everest York Seymour left a large bequest after his death in 1966 that was used by The University of Sydney to help fund the construction of the Seymour Centre. The University is also home to the Nicholson Collection the largest collection of antiquities in the Southern Hemisphere with





over 3000 artifacts. **Sir Charles Nicholson** (1808-1903) a doctor, scholar, statesman and an influential figure in the 19th century made significant donations during his lifetime as well as a bequeathing his own collection of books, manuscripts, tapestries and other significant artworks.

J F Archibald (1856-1919) a journalist and founder of the Bulletin magazine left funds in his Will for the famous Archibald Fountain to be built in Sydney's Hyde Park. He was a trustee of the Art Gallery of NSW and had an interest in promoting up and coming artists hence his bequest for the annual portrait art prize named in his honour.

JRS Australia is one of the largest providers of direct support to people seeking asylum in Australia having worked with over 3,068 people in 2018 alone, including children and families evacuated from Nauru and men from Manus Island.

At JRS we witness the anguish and despair of families seeking protection in our country, like Leila, Yaser and their two children who came to Australia fleeing violence and persecution.

Yaser and his family came to Australia seeking safety after Yaser experienced torture and faced ongoing persecution in his home country. While Yaser was initially able to work to support his voung family, he developed a serious illness, which left him hospitalised and unable to work for months. When he was discharged from hospital, he was advised against doing any demanding activity and could not continue working. Suddenly, the family no longer had a stable source of income. There was no family here to support them, but returning home was not an option. They applied for a basic living allowance for support through this period of crisis, but their application was rejected. Today this family relies on JRS' financial support and foodbank services to supplement the minimal income Leila receives working casually in a kitchen. She also cares for her sick husband and two primary-school age children, and therefore can only work a few hours per week, early in the morning or late at night. Leila is unable to sleep. She has developed a persistent lower back pain, and has been referred to a psychotherapist, JRS has been accompanying and serving this family and many others that experience hardship on daily basis.

THE IMPORTANCE OF HAVING AN UP-TO-DATE WILL



When is the best time to write or update your Will? The answer is simple, now. We probably have been procrastinating about getting your legal affairs in order for some time but the consequences of not having a valid Will can be immense.

If you pass away without a Will then generally the courts will decide on whom to give you estate to - which may not be what you had in mind. Or worse still, the government inherits your assets. Many people have a Will but it can already be out-of-date with changing circumstances, both with you and with your listed beneficiaries.

Actually making a Will is usually very simple. Prepare some details about you and you property beforehand (see checklist in this Guide), make an appointment with a solicitor and leave it to them to prepare. Then just return usually a week later to sign the papers. Your Will should then be reviewed at east every five years. Leave your Will with your solicitor for safe keeping and have a few copies for yourself and perhaps for the executor of your estate.

CHECK LIST

It's a good idea before making an appointment to prepare your Will, to take along as many details about yourself as possible for your Solicitor. Additionally write down your decisions as to the disbursement of your estate. Keep this information along with a copy of your Will in a safe place.
