

Spirit of Love

I based my artwork on *Matthew* 1:18-25 when the Angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph in a dream. The angel said, "Do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife, for the child conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit." My artwork represents how I think Joseph would have felt after the Holy Spirit visited him. Joseph was planning to quietly divorce Mary because he was a good and kind man. I imagine he would have felt upset about the prospect of doing this. Then, when Joseph was told in a dream that Jesus was conceived by the Holy Spirit he would have felt a great sense of relief and joy. The foil and metallic ink make my artwork shine like the many stained-glass windows I took my inspiration from.



My bold and striking image shows Mary and Joseph forced to register for a census in a town far away. Their treacherous journey takes them along the Jordan River, over the hills surrounding Jerusalem and onto Bethlehem, a total of 90 miles. I tried to capture the feeling of uncertainty in my artwork through the use of bold colours and rugged mountains. I imagine a very grueling trip. Red signifies danger. The journey would have been full of hazards. Lions and bears lived in the woods and bandits and pirates were also common. I used blue for the mountains as it symbolises light, power and mystery and reminds us of the love Mary and Joseph felt for Jesus. The amazing pink light of the blazing moon represents the end of the journey and reminds us of God's promise to send the 'Saviour'. My artwork highlights this significant moment and that Jesus was indeed the light of the world.

Following the Star



Peace and New Beginning

In my artwork I painted Mary and Jesus. Mary's face is not visible in the painting, but I used watercolour paints to replicate how Mary would hold Jesus, as her hands are delicate and support him with love. Mary's robes are coloured ultramarine, as in classic artworks this is a widely favoured colour used for her clothing. The gold embroideries on her sleeve signifies her holiness. Floating from Mary's hands, there is a mist indicating the morning, and therefore a new beginning. The olive branches signify peace among all, and the two additions to the artwork convey that Jesus will bring new peace to the world. The star behind Mary and Jesus is the same star that led the Shepherds and Magi to the stable where Jesus was born. It shows the light He will bring on the new day. This light inspired me to show Mary holding this precious gift for the world to see. "And they shall call him Immanuel" Mary's hands are visible in the painting depicting holiness and humility, showing that, 'God is with us.'

My artwork reflects the Scripture passage Matthew 2:9-12, "The Visit of the Magi". In this passage, the wise men followed the star and presented gifts to Jesus. 

Joseph takes Mary as his Wife

My artwork was inspired by the bible passage Matthew 1:24 - 25. In this passage the angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph in a dream commanding him to take Mary home as his wife. Mary eventually gave birth to a son and named him Jesus. I chose this Scripture because I believe that it was of great importance to our salvation. Joseph demonstrated great faith to take Mary as his wife, even though she was already with child. When Jesus was born, our Saviour was born and Joseph was at Mary's side. I used graphite pencils to create my artwork because it is my favourite medium to work with. Using varying degrees of pressure on the pencil, I created contrasting lines and patterns in my artwork. The patterns relate to the emotions I imagine Joseph and Mary would have experienced leading up to and at the birth of Jesus. Joseph has tears pouring from his eyes to represent the confusion and love he would have been feeling toward Mary and Jesus. Mary has the flame of the Holy Spirit beneath her, supporting her through the birth of her son. The Holy family is wrapped together to illustrate the close bond they formed immediately after Jesus was born. Mary and Joseph are gazing down with love and awe on the baby Jesus and He is looking back at them.

Embracing Jesus' Family

My multimedia artwork reflects on the scripture passage 'The Visit of the Magi' (*Matthew* 2: 9-12). I believe this story highlights a very significant and momentous time in the story of Jesus our saviour. My artwork has three different coloured double lines around the birth of Jesus and the Magi searching for him. I chose the colours used by the church that represent Advent/Lent, Ordinary Time and Pentecost. These lines embrace the image of the Holy Family at the birth of Jesus. I used watercolour and coloured pencils to create these lines and the patterns within. The gradation of the night sky was created with watercolour. In the sky are the stars that guide the Magi to Jesus. One of the silhouettes of the Magi is pointing to the sky to show the way. The background is painted in yellow, orange and some brown to remind us that with the birth of Jesus came not only a feeling of love but also of hope.



The News of Hope

My Christmas Story artwork was based on the scripture passage 'The Annunciation' (*Luke* 1: 26-36). My painting is titled, 'The News of Hope,' as Mary receives the news that she will be the Mother of God. For my artwork, I used a mixed media including: ink, watercolour, paint, Fineliner on board and canvases. The Annunciation is a story that has many meaningful symbols. Mary and the Annunciation are often associated with flowers, most particularly white lilies, as they are thought to represent her purity and love for God. In the centre of my artwork is the Cross, symbolizing Jesus, with a dove on top representing the Holy Spirit. I painted Mary and the Archangel Gabriel on the sides of the Cross. Surrounding the cross is an array of Australian flowers such as banksias, bottle brushes, kangaroo paws and wattles. I wanted to show how beautiful Australia is, created by God as a unique, spiritual place and my home. Nature helps us to connect with beauty and remember how fragile and beautiful our land is.

Love and Spite

My artwork titled 'Love and Spite' presents the story of the Holy Family's flight to Egypt (*Matthew* 2:13-25). I begin by highlighting an incredible love, the love of the Holy family. Joseph and Mary hold baby Jesus, protecting him and sheltering him from the evil that surrounds him. I used varied tones of red to symbolise evil, as well as purple to symbolise royalty. The Holy Family is shown inside the face of King Herod. This represents how the mind of King Herod was always on the downfall and torture of others. Herod saw Jesus as a threat and he would stop at nothing to destroy him. I used the uneven lines in the background to create a sense of extreme, powerful energy that came from the spitefulness of Herod. Thankfully, Jesus had the love of his family and their incredible determination to protect their son, represented by the heart shape that is created from their white garments. This story of love and protection is in so many ways similar to that of my family. My mother's parents risked everything to escape the evil government and war in Vietnam to bring her to safety here in Australia. I connect with this scripture as it reminds me that God is always with us and he will be there to lead us to a safe place.



I have used white charcoal on Mary and Jesus' faces, symbolising holiness and purity within them. Their halos are a mixture of white pencil and brilliant gold Texta to imitate royalty and wisdom of an endearing King. The background is a creative design of repeated flowers, signifying beauty in Mary's heart. It reminds me of dreaming, an open, thought-filled mind and elation as to what is still to come.
