Virtues of Leadership

he world is full of advice for leaders and aspiring leaders alike. Thousands of books and articles are generated each year professing to have the answers to leadership challenges both big and small.

Universities run courses specifically designed to turbo charge careers through the very latest in leadership theory and practice.

Conferences and seminars abound with experts regaling attendees with stories about their heroic journey through the peaks and valleys of their varied careers.

While all this is helpful, there are some enduring qualities that will serve any leader and indeed any person and apply equally to both career and life. Known as the cardinal virtues, they are aspirational foundations that can help any leader in almost any situation to make better decisions.

Prudence is foundational to any good leadership and is the gift of wisdom. To be wise is to match goodness with reality and to be endlessly curious about what is right and life giving - truly great leaders, no matter how imperfectly, are always

striving to be prudent. Justice is a concept that is in constant conflict with emotion and relativism. While our legal system is imperfect and ever changing, a system of governance is one of the foundation stones of a just and civil society and forms an essential component of strong leadership. Put simply, a just leader is a fair leader who acts on principles and the truth always.

Fortitude is courage and the willingness to stand up when the going gets tough. There are times when leaders struggle to stand up for what is right, especially when

numbers are stacked against them. To be prudent and just at times like these requires fortitude and the ability to see beyond the most challenging moments and stick to what is right.

Temperance is most often associated with consumption but it is much more than that. Temperance is the virtue of being measured and considered in everything we do and is the opposite of impulsive or reflexive leadership. To be temperate is to be calm and to develop the skill of processing clearly and comprehensively in the most difficult of situations. A temperate

leader shows grace under fire. These classical virtues are made more real and vivid to us through the Christian virtues of faith, hope and charity. In our faith we are most fully realised, and through our belief that we are born in the image and likeness of God we are brought closer to the transcendent and infinite love of God.

Leadership - like life - is a series of hits and misses, triumphs and failures and day to day moments that are as uneventful as they are necessary. Above all, Catholic leadership is a gift that must be examined, nurtured and grown through Christ centred service and personal witness.





Once elected, Student Leaders will be expected to comply with the following expectations:




The College, founded by the De La Salle Brothers, also has a fine tradition of following the Lasallian charism and has 50 leaders who run social justice initiatives in the school.



Sydney Catholic Schools trains new generation of general sports officers

ith diminishing numbers of athletics officials available to conduct schools athletics carnivals, Sydney Catholic Schools (SCS) has taken a proactive approach by training 22 General Sports officers to conduct them.

Athletics carnivals are a key aspect of sport in schools and officials are essential to their smooth operation.

The initiative will ensure school events are conducted in compliance with the rules and regulations set by the International Athletics Federation.

The training was conducted by Barry Pecar, a seasoned athletics official with more than three decades of experience. Mr Pecar welcomed the enthusiasm and willingness shown by participants in learning the technicalities and intricacies of of-

ficiating athletics events. He believes that the dedication of the newly trained officials will ensure quality experiences for the children who participate in the events.

The shortage of athletics officials has become a concern for schools and sporting organisations worldwide.

It became more pronounced during the COV-ID-19 pandemic as many officials retired or stepped back from their roles due to health concerns. The lack has even led to the cancellation or postponement of several sporting events, causing disappointment for athletes and spectators alike.

SCS's initiative is a step towards addressing this challenge, with Mr Pecar saying he hoped it would serve as a model for other schools and organisations to follow.

He also hopes that engaging young people in officiat-

ing athletics events will help apprentice a new generation of officials who can take over when current officials retire or step down.

The training covered topics such as starting and finishing procedures, track and field events, and rules and regulations of athletics events. Participants were also taught about safety protocols and procedures to ensure that events are conducted as safe and securely as possible.

The success of the program is encouraging, with SCS planning to conduct similar programs in the future to ensure that the school athletics events are conducted consistently with international standards.

With the Brisbane Olympics scheduled for 2032, the need for trained officials will be even greater.

The four students, who were chosen by their peers for their exemplary conduct and attitude within the school community, received their badges at a ceremony in front of an audience that included Jane Bridges OAM, Supervisor for Student Wellbeing Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islander at Sydney Catholic Schools.

- The quartet's election into the Student Leadership Team represents a proud milestone for the college and comes after it became the first Catholic school in the Sutherland Shire to introduce a Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP) last year.

Natasha Dalton-Hughes, St John Bosco College Engadine's Indigenous Coordinator, said seeing the students badged was a proud moment for all. "The four students have demonstrated exceptional leadership qualities and they are all fully deserving of this recognition," Mrs Dalton-Hughes said.

"Many of them have engaged in different cultural events and mentoring opportunities within the school, as well as with the local community and Aboriginal elders for a long time."

"We have 37 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students at the school and for them to be able to see their peers in leadership positions will inspire them to fulfil their potential and to aspire to something similar," Mrs Dalton-Hughes said.

In 2022, St John Bosco College Engadine launched its first RAP to formalise the college's commitment towards reconciliation in and around the school and within its local community.

Jenny Fowler, Principal at St John Bosco College Engadine, said she was looking forward to seeing the four student leaders continuing to build on the college's commitment to building relationships and working with the local communities.

"Our four Aboriginal students are all role models for our younger Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students as they show them that through their passion and pride in education, culture and leadership, opportunities arise where they can make a difference in their community in a powerful way," Mrs Fowler said.

The college has a number of frameworks in place that help build sustainable, transformational relationships including RAP working party meetings each term.

This year, the college's commitment to learning more about First Nations histories, cultures, languages will also see all staff undertake a Cultural Competency course, while all students will be contributing to a large college artwork under the guidance of two Aboriginal artists.

Catholic schools as centres of spiritual growth

At a Mass for Beginning Teachers for Sydney Catholic Schools in March, Archbishop Anthony Fisher OP reflected at length on the unique mission of Catholic schools in his homily.

"Parents no longer enrol their kids out of mere tribal loyalty as Catholics; they want to see academic results, not just high sounding spiritual or pastoral rhetoric. Justice to our students demands attention to learning gain and academic excellence, but so do enrolment numbers", he explained.

"Yet Catholic schools are called to more than simple test scores and market share. Together with academic formation they must be places of moral conversion; as much as intellectual development, they seek spiritual growth".

"The animating principle of daily life of the Catholic school must be belief in the person and Gospel of Jesus Christ or else it is dead", Archbishop Fisher emphasised.

"All the virtues must be cultivated in staff and students, especially faith, hope and charity, or else it is a fraud. A deeper wisdom must be sought about the meaning of God,

the universe and ourselves, or else it is a failure. Much of this doesn't track easily on a website. Yet children are entrusted to us precisely so that we might attend to and form the whole person", he added.

This inherent mission of the Catholic school to cultivate Gospel values in its students is clearly being lived out across our Catholic schools in Sydney with many achievements highlighted in this *Catholic School Leaders supplement*.

One tangible way this is occurring each day across the wide network

of primary schools in the Sydney Catholic Schools' network is through the family educator program.

Family educators, who are often school parents engaged in the local parish community are responsible for helping to connect families with the religious life of the school and the parish, and promoting the Catholic mission and identity of the primary school.

Their work proved to be particularly beneficial during the COVID-19 pandemic when both parishes and schools had to put face-to-face in-

teraction on hold and the family educators helped lead prayer and catechesis to help keep families connected to their Catholic school and parish during the challenges of lockdowns.

Central to this work is what Archbishop Fisher captured well as he spoke with staff and students at the opening Mass for the new Sacred Heart Primary School in Matravillle-"Transmit faith in Christ to your families, parishes, school and community...Be the Heart of Jesus to each other".



This is due to the College being unable to meet demand; being situated in the fastest growing LGA in Australia! As a result, plans for additional building works are well underway to complement the vibrate, already existing, facilities. The additions will include more general learning areas, some breakout learning areas, a new library and hall. Work will begin in earnest shortly.































Living out the mission of Catholic education

By Michael Kenny

Like many religious orders engaged in Catholic education, Catholic schools have sought to live out the same mission

In an address at a major Vatican gathering last year, Pope Francis reminded members of a religious congregation with a proud history as a teaching order that Catholic schools should not be Christian in name only, but that Christian educators must first of all be witnesses to the Gospel, committed to making humanity grow according to Christ.

The pope was speaking at the 46th General Chapter of the De La Salle Brothers, a congregation which has had a profound impact on Catholic education in Australia over many generations and continues to do so with a number of Lassallian schools

featured in this *Catholic School Leaders* supplement.

Pope Francis reminded the Brothers that Christian teachers make a specific contribution to evangelisation since they have a responsibility to pass on Christian values to their students, "educating so as to move from a closed world to an open world; from a throwaway culture to a culture of care; from a culture of rejection to a culture of integration; from the pursuit of vested interests to the pursuit of the common good".

out this mission, encapsulated in a motto proudly displayed in many Lasallian schools- "Enter to learn, leave to serve. Senior students in these schools are encouraged to engage in overseas immersion programs in disadvantaged countries, for example, in turn helping to nurture future lives of community service shaped by Gospel values.

This is similarly true of many of the secondary Catholic Schools featured in this *Catholic School Leaders* supplement. Mary MacKillop College in Wakeley in south-western Sydney, for example, draws inspiration from Australia's first saint and her commitment to serving the disadvantaged through programs to support the homeless. Holy Cross College in Ryde and Patri-

cian Brothers College in Fairfield, for example, are both shaped by the founder of the Patrician Brothers, the 19th century Irish bishop, Daniel Delaney, who help lift generations of poor Catholics out of poverty while ensuring his schools always passed on firm foundations of the faith.

At the heart of all Catholic schools is a mission to transform lives through nurturing a pathway to Christ and as Pope Francis reminded the De La Salle Brothers, "by following him, by walking with him, our lives are transformed and we in turn become leaven, salt and light".







Teast of OUR LADY of FATIMA

In her message to three Portuguese shepherd children on 13 July 1917, Our Lady asked them to "pray the rosary every day in honour of Our Lady of the rosary, in order to obtain peace for the world."

Over a century later, thousands of Sydney's faithful gathered at St Mary's Cathedral to live out this message at a celebration marking the anniversary of Our Lady's first apparition in Fatima, Portugal.

Sydney Auxiliary Bishop Richard Umbers was joined by Ukranian Catholic Eparch Mykola Bychok CSSR, along with religious and clergy of the Archdiocese of Sydney, to celebrate the feast with a Vigil Mass, the recitation of the holy rosary and a candle-lit public procession around the cathedral forecourt.

In the lead up to World Youth Day Lisbon (WYD) in August, Sydney Catholic Youth team leader Milad Khalil encouraged WYD pilgrims to take part in the procession and experience walking side by side with people, united with Mary, from "different parishes, schools, backgrounds, ages and stages in their faith journey."

New research finds young people can learn empathy at university

Growing interest in experiential learning models such as service-learning or community engagement, where students complete compulsory community work as well as learn theory in lectures and tutorials, has seen a proliferation of programs offered at universities worldwide.

For example, all students who study at Australian Catholic University participate in community engagement as part of the Core Curriculum.

However little research has investigated whether community placements can lead to an increase in empathy among students, until now.

Researchers at Australian Catholic University (ACU) analysed the experiences of 1410 university students, taken from 35 separate studies, who were involved in face-to-face service with community members who experienced some form of disadvantage and marginalisation.

The meta-analysis and qualitative meta-synthesis, published in *Educational Research Review*,

found students who completed organised community placements through their universities were more empathic and understanding of people whose personal circumstances were different to theirs. The research paper is the first systematic evidence that shows service-learning contributes positively to student empathy.

ACU Research Fellow Dr Chloe Gordon, one of the lead researchers, said as well as showing evidence of increased empathy, the research revealed that direct interactions with community members was an influencing factor.

"One student in a study acknowledged how easy it was to read about people's stories, but when you were watching them tell their story, with tears in their eyes, you felt a degree of the pain they felt and it resulted in a transformative experience," Dr Gordon said.

Dr Gordon said the research might be useful to employers, since an increasing number of professions want graduates who



can connect with, and work effectively with people from diverse backgrounds. "Soft skills are increasingly seen as critical skills in the workplace, where employers want graduates who are able to work with a diverse range of people," Dr Gordon said.

"Empathy, which is defined broadly as the act of perceiving, understanding, experiencing and responding to the emotional state and ideas of another person, is one of these critical skills.

"Our research shows that learning models such as service-learn-

ing or community engagement can help students to become more empathic." Dr Gordon said the former New Zealand Prime Minister Jacinda Ardern was a powerful example of one leader who made a strong impact with her empathetic approach.

"A strong theme in our findings was service-learning leading to identifying with another person and recognising their common humanity," Dr Gordon said.

"One of the most impactful global examples of this was when Jacinda Ardern grieved with Muslim families following the Christchurch attack, wearing the hijab as a sign of respect. Her ability to show authentic empathy and translate this into action as a world leader was inspiring.

"Even in the wake of her resignation as Prime Minister, she was still trending for being a strong leader who was empathetic."
