Archbishop Fisher OP Student Leaders luncheon

Christians should not accept "progressive" or "conservative" labels for themselves, but only strive to align themselves closely with Christ and his church, Archbishop Anthony Fisher OP told young leaders at the annual student leadership luncheon.

Year 12 students of Sydney Catholic School's eastern district met at Cathedral House to break bread and discuss their burning questions on faith and leadership with each other and their archbishop.

The lunch was the first of three to be hosted by Archbishop Fisher and Sydney Catholic Schools again this year.

They provide student leaders with relaxed opportunities to speak with the spiritual leader about matters close to their hearts and to seek his advice, as well as meet with archdiocesan youth leaders.

Students from nearly 20 schools attended in March, including one student from St Ignatius College in Riverview who inquired about the church's capacity to remove "conservative" obligations in order to reflect the present "progressive" society and its changing values.

"I'd say to all, be careful of being pigeonholed into a camp of progressive or conservative," the archbishop responded.

"These aren't categories for Christians, we care simply about truth and people.

"If we do join a camp, then the only camp we join is Jesus.'

"We ask ourselves what he has said, what he would do and what he has demonstrated in his life, his church, and its traditions. "When we do this, we can see some components of our faith are perennial and for every generation, while other aspects—as in any religion—are cultural elements or customs arisen at one stage or another that may be passing."

Asked how modern Catholics can combat spiritual dryness and connect with God in prayer, the archbishop said that prayer is "just talking to a friend."

"We should be both comfortable with formal prayers and also the spontaneous prayer that comes out of your heart," he said.

"People at times can overcomplicate prayer, but I'm quite childish in mine just as a child with their parents.

"Bring God those simple needs in your heart—they are the easiest to express because they come so naturally to us as children of God."

Marist Catholic College North Shore leaders Tyler Sestito and Carsten Muller said they had been nervous about meeting the archbishop but left with an inspired sense of hope.

"Listening to his responses on a range of difficult topics showed the archbishop is a very genuine and well-educated man, not just a church figure but also very approachable," Carsten said.

"What I can take from his words today is certainly an illuminated idea of how to bring Christianity into our school and outer communities," Tyler added.

The archbishop also hosted the luncheon in Sydney's western and central regions.



belonging matter," he said. "It is accepting high standards as a College community and maintaining those every single day we put on our uniform."


"It is supporting our brothers and teachers in times of hardship and stress, and being the first to congratulate them for successes and good deeds."

Leading the nation with the Amadeus Music Education Program

Sydney Catholic Schools is committed to putting its students at the centre of everything it does and with Amadeus, it is not only rolling out unprecedented classroom music lessons from kindergarten, but providing students the teaching and support they need to learn and thrive.

Amadeus students undertake instrumental tuition in small groups of five to eight for 30 minutes per week, learning to play on a string, woodwind, or brass instrument. Students also play their instrument in a string ensemble, orchestra, or concert band (whole of class) for up to one hour per week.

Professional musicians tutor students and nurture their passion and skills to meet musical outcomes for the NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA) and Quality Music Instruction, and support students to complete standard graded music exams.

These music tutors bring professional experience from orchestras and ensembles around Australia and the world.

The program has the support of renowned stakeholders within the music industry including Opera Australia, the Sydney Conservatorium of Music and Sydney Youth Orchestras. Students are given the opportunity

to perform at school and parish level, at larger inter school events and at Sydney Catholic Schools' competitions and showcases, including Sydney Catholic Schools' Performing Arts Festival and Eisteddfod.

The Kindergarten to Year 8 scope of the program means there is a continuum of music education from a student's primary school to their secondary school. Students can also choose to continue Music as an elective into Year 9 and beyond.



PURPOSE CAMP

Young people across Sydney are 'on fire' with the Holy Spirit, sparking soaring attendance rates at Catholic youth events, and growing calls for youth ministry and formation in schools.

Following their hugely successful Purpose Conference in December last year, the Sydney Catholic Youth (SCY) team has seen record expressions of interest for them to attend schools and host events, as exhibited at the team's annual Purpose Camp.

In a time meant for sleep-ins, catchups and movie marathons, more than 120 teenagers instead took time out of their school holidays for Christ at this year's Purpose Camp, which was the maximum capacity for the event.

Students from Year 9-12 rushed to book their places at the three days annual archdiocesan youth camp last week, facilitated by the SCY team, camp chaplain Fr Bijoy Joseph, and soon to be ordained seminarian Justin Faehrmann.

The hugely successful camp follows five months on from SCY's inaugural Purpose Conference last December, which saw

almost 2000 teens and young adults come together to witness faith from international formators like Matt Fradd and Jason Evert.

The SCY team continued to witness the Holy Spirit at work during the camp at a packed-out Benedict XVI Retreat Centre, which many teens attested was the perfect way to keep the fire burning.

"I attended Purpose Conference last year and when I saw the flyer for the camp, I paused everything I was doing to sign up. I knew based on the conference that three days at camp would be perfect for me" shared a Year 11 student from Trinity Catholic College, Auburn.

Others who were totally new to the experience of faith left the camp with a genuine and deep desire for more.

One year 10 student from Marist Sisters' Woolwich was initially "not entirely open to the camp, but as it progressed, I opened myself more to the experience of God, which produced such a powerful and overwhelming feeling."

Games and competitions, music and bonfires, Eucharistic adoration and confession, a candlelit rosary procession,



faith talks and discussions, laughs and tears of joy, and of course, beautiful solemn sung masses, had the teens hesitating to get back on buses to head home.

"Jesus wiped away the fear I had about the world. I realised during all-night adoration that true love has no fear, and to God nothing is impossible" said one participant from St Aloysius, Milson's Point.

"During the last mystery of the rosary procession (the crucifixion) when we were all kneeling on the hill at the foot of the cross, I really felt God's love over me and how much he loves us," said another student from Freeman Catholic College.

Participants were deeply appreciative of an experience that watered the seeds that

were initially planted in their hearts at the Purpose Conference.

"There should be no hesitation whatsoever to offer the Catholic faith in its fullness to young people, and the SCY team use every opportunity possible to do that", said SCY team leader Milad Khalil.

"The openness, growth, healing and pure joy we have witnessed among thousands of youth over the last few months has been an absolute blessing and joy. We really do have the incredible privilege of seeing how God works in the lives of all we minister to."

Camp chaplain Fr Bijoy shared a similar sentiment.

"As chaplain, it was encouraging to see how much the kids were thirsting for God. So many had thought-filled and profound questions about the faith," said Fr Bijoy.

"They want something so much deeper than what the prevailing culture can offer. We must not be afraid to challenge students to grow in faith rather than water down faith's requirements."

Special thanks also go to the Mission and Identity directorate from Sydney Catholic Schools for supporting students from SCS schools through ticket subsidies.

The Sydney Catholic Youth team will now continue the journey of faith with camp participants through their Purpose High program, where they offer ongoing formation to high school students.

How the liberal arts can complement law

For Nick Long, the relationship between the arts and law is central to his pursuit of becoming a great lawyer.

The Ramsay Scholarship recipient for Australian Catholic University's Western Civilisation program is halfway through the double degree in Arts (Western Civilisation) and Laws.

Having loved English as a teenager, the double degree combines his passion for literature with a growing commitment to public service and the law.

"At the moment we've been studying the work of philosopher John Locke, and in Law we're doing a property course. Being able to incorporate John Locke's theory of property and other broad conceptual legal theories to understand of modern property law act has really helped me," Nick said.

"Our first assignment was on concepts of property law, but it felt like an arts assignment since I was just looking at all my notes on John Locke from last year."

Although initially offered early entry into a Bachelor of Arts/Bachelor of Laws through ACU Guarantee, Nick took up the opportunity to apply for a Ramsay Scholarship of \$160,000 to enrol in the Western Civilisation program.

The Ramsay name was extremely familiar to him in high school, since both he and Paul Ramsay AO, founder of the Ramsay Centre which funds ACU's Western Civilisation

program, share the same alma mater in St Ignatius' College, Riverview.

Going from a Catholic high school informed by the spirituality of St Ignatius of Loyola, straight into a Catholic university, has shaped Nick's approach to faith as a university student.

Born into a Northern Irish family, the fraught and often turbulent religious history of the region imbued much of Nick's understanding of the Catholic faith growing up.

"I joke with some of my friends that my family were 'ethnically Catholic' but we'd go to Mass on Sunday as kids and never really know what was going on," Nick said.

"Now that I'm coming to a higher education institution that is Catholic, you see how the faith permeates all the way down. Understanding the Catholic intellectual tradition through my degree, and experiencing the practical aspects of faith, I find myself getting a lot closer to the teachings that I was supposed to be learning as a kid or at school. Particularly when things are getting quite hectic at uni or with work or with family and everything, going back to what I had learned at school makes a massive difference.

"Today religion is often talked about as something that's impractical but in my experience, particularly being at ACU, it's definitely not the case."





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
